THE headmaster of the primary school shut down by classroom vandals has asked to be retired early.

Colin McLoughlin, who is in his fiftles, is "a shattered man," said an education chief yesterday. If his request is approved he will retire in July, and he will probably be given sick leave until then.

Mr. McLoughlin is head of St. Saviour's Church of England School in Toxteth, Liverpool, which has been ravaged by classroom riots for several weeks.

"He is a sick man, said Liverpool's education committee chairman Michael Storey.

"The last few weeks have been absolute hell for him and he is shattered. The trouble has driven him to despair.
