Littlewoods chiefs stay silent on talks

UNION leaders and Littlewoods bosses were tight lipped today following talks yesterday over fears of 59 compulsory redundancies among computer staff at the group's Liverpool headquarters.

Littlewoods Group PR director Harry Thomas, who chaired the meeting in the 100 Old Hall Street complex, said today: "Negotiations are ongoing and ourselves and the union representatives have agreed not to talk with the media."
Yesterday's talks involved representatives of the shop workers' union Usdaw and the Supervisory

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It followed an announcement last week that the stores and pools giant is looking at "out sourcing" the operations of the central computer operations covering the chain store and Index divisions.

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Workers claim that Redditch-based information technology services company AT&T Istel is poised to take over the computer operations.

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AT&T torporate marketing director Phil Coathup declined to comment on negotiations with Littlewoods.

The international company, which plans to set up a new operations base in Barnsley next year, already manages computer networks for chents like IBM and ICI.

An internal Little-woods union memoreleased after last works announcement claims that full time officials Frank Murphy, for SATA, and Usdaw's Tony Bennett were "outraged that the company saw fit to ride a coach and horses through the union andcompany agreements and totally ignations to consult fully."

Bail for PO sorter on murder charge

A POST OFFICE sorter from Liverpool facing a murder charge was granted ball by Wirral magistrates with conditions which included providing sureties totalling £40,000.

The court also ordered that Stephen Paul Wilson, 20, of Holt Road, Kensington, keep out of Wirral, stay away from all witnesses and report twice weekly to the police. A night curfew was imposed between 11pm and 6am.

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Wilson is due to return to court on September 3, the date set for committal proceedings.
It is alleged he murdered 23-year-old bus washer James Alan Crowther from Rock Ferry on a Birkenhead car park on June 28.
Martin Decker, prosecuting, did not object to bail with stringent conditions. Wilson was represented by John O'Leary. Reporting restrictions were not lifted.
