Lusitania man dies, aged 96

ENGLISH-born Martin Sylvester Payne, a First World War veteran who survived the sinking of the British liner Lusitania in 1915, has died, aged 96.

Payne, who was born in Lincoln, and who served as a lieutenant in the Army during the war, was aboard the Lusitania on May 7, 1915, when a German submarine sank the ship in the Irish Sea. Nearly 1,200 of the 1,500 aboard died.

After the war he moved to the

After the war he moved to the US and retired to Birmingham, Alabama, in 1969.
